d. May 10, 1896 age 35

Mrs Guy ALEXANDER died at her house of pneumonia in Doaktown Sunday last. Aged 35 years, she leaves a husband and six children. In spectator of schools, G W MERSEREAU is a brother of the deceased. *Union Advocate 20 May 1896*

### **ATTRIDGE, Richard: d. October 1907**

Richard ATTRIDGE died at his home in Doaktown. In the Presbyterian Church on that date the Sabbath School observed Children's Day, and the services were being conducted by Mr Attridge, who was the Superintendent of the school. The Pastor, Rev Mr McDonald observed that Mr Attridge seemed to be suffering. Mr McDonald went to him and Mr Attridge told him he was suffering intense pain. He was assisted to the door by Dr Wier, who was in the church, and one or two friends. The doctor had him taken home and gave him the closest personal attention during the afternoon. On reaching home he was able to converse with his family, but after about an hour or two he passed into a comatose state from which he never revived.

**MR. ATTRIDGE** was about 71 years of age, and leaves a family of two sons and three daughters. He has been a strong personality on the Miramichi for years. He has represented the parish at the council board, has been school trustee for years and superintendent of the Presbyterian Sunday School for 20 years or more. His life has been influential for good, and he was much respected. Mr. Attridge was twice married, his first wife Miss FREEZE of the Miramichi and his second wife Miss PERLEY of Chatham. Five children survive him. *Union Advocate 16 October 1907*

### **AUSTIN; Horace d. 1907**

Mr Horace AUSTIN died at Doaktown of infirmities of old age. Mr Austin was well known being one of the eldest men in that section of Northumberland County. His wife died several years ago. Mr AUSTIN is survived by his own children, grandchildren and great grandchildren. Mr Austin for many years was in the employ of Mr Harvey DOAK and his father and at times ran their carding mill for them. *Union Advocate 14 August 1907*

### **BAGGS, James d. December 6, 1825**

Visitors at Douglastown should not fail to visit the last resting place of James BAGGS. There is a story connected with his burial which is very interesting. He died December 6, 1825, a day or two before the Great Miramichi Fire. When people were fleeing for their lives to the river and other places of safety, the remains of James BAGGS was laying undistributed in his late home. Strange to say every house in Douglastown, except the one that contained his body was a victim of that conflagration. Mr Bagg's remains were interred a few days afterwards as near his late home as possible, and a stone with an inscription marks the grave today. *Union Advocate: 3 October 1900*

### **BARRON, Mrs Jane nee GILLIS:**

d. December 2, 1907-age 95

Mrs David BARRON, of Lower Derby died on Monday, Dec 2nd. A widow aged 95 years last May. Her maiden name was Jane GILLIS, a native of this country. Children surviving her are: Mrs Catherine FITZGERALD, Oshkosh, Wis, Daniel and George at home; Henry in Nevada, and Archibald in Stillwater, Minn. Funeral was at the Anglican Church at Millerton. *Union Advocate: 4 December 1907*

### **BRYENTON: Isaac P:**

d. February 16, 1901-age 38

Isaac P. BRYENTON formerly of Derby died at Rochester, Mass at the home of his sister, Mrs G E DUNBAR of Stillwater, 16 February. He was the youngest son of George and Mary BRYENTON of Derby, age 38 years old. His body was brought home. In Derby he has six brothers and five sisters. *Union Advocate: 6 March 1901*

### **BOCKLER, Francis d. 1908-age 76**

Mr Francis BOCKLER of Newcastle died at his home, age 76 years. The deceased, who came to this country from Stettin, Germany, forty three years ago, was a master of the art of painting. as he is evidenced by the artiste interiors of many of Northumberland County's churches and other buildings.

He was one of Newcastle's most respected citizens and a faithful member of the Presbyterian Church.

His wife, formerly Miss Margaret MURRAY, predeceased him about a year and a half. He is survived by five daughters: Mrs M. ALLISON of Hurricane Isle, Maine, Mrs F L BELKNOPP of Methuen, Mass, Mrs C G DEMILLE of Moncton and the Misses Minnie and Adelaide at home. The funeral will be held tomorrow

James BLACK of Campbellton lost his footing and fell from the train three cars passed over his body. The body was horribly mangled. He leaves a wife and a large family of small children. He moved to Campbellton a few years ago from Newcastle. *Union Advocate: 15 February 1905*  
*Provincial archives states James Black died on February 11, 1905-age 39*

**BETTS: Miss Jane** d. May 1906  
Miss Jane BETTS, burned to death at her home in Millerton. Miss BETTS who lived alone in a small house, had been at John BETTS for tea on Wednesday afternoon and went home about six o'clock. Soon after she entered the house volumes of smoke were seen pouring out of the place. A man named FAILES ran to the house but found the front door locked. Later he secured an axe and broke down the front door, the place was full of smoke and it was so dense that as often as he tried to enter, he was forced back. It was some time before the fire could be put out and the smoke cleared away enough to allow anybody to enter but this time Miss BATES was dead. Her body was found not far from the stove and it is supposed that while trying to light the fire her clothes caught and she was burned to death. *Union Advocate 16 May 1906*

**CASSIDY: C. Gilmour** d. February 1901-age 2  
C. Gilmour CASSIDY, died, son of Mr and Mrs Geo CASSIDY, was held on Sunday afternoon. Rev S J MacArthur conducted the service at the home and interment was in St James Cemetery. Pallbearers were four boys: Harold RUSSELL, Arthur ASHFORD, Bernard MacDONALD and Charles McCULLUM. The deceased was two years old. *Union Advocate: 22 February 1910*

**CARRUTHERS: Mrs George nee Creighton** d. September 1903-age 80  
Mrs George CARRUTHERS died at Moorefield last Thursday. A native of Aberdrenshire, Scotland; maiden name was Jean CREIGHTON who married fifty four years ago. She was 80 years old.  
She leaves a husband, four sons and five daughters. Interred at Moorefield Cemetery by Rev Mr Henderson. *Union Advocate: 30 September 1903*

# THE MIRAMICHI HISTORY OF LOCAL FAMILIES

## THE FLAHERTY'S FAMILY HISTORY

By Don Ross (May 2007)

**JAMES FLAHERTY** was appointed the Minister of Finance for/by our Prime Minister Stephen Harper. The announcement meant little to me although the name Flaherty caught my attention for being into genealogy. I'd done a bit of research into the Flaherty family that lives in my community of Loggieville. Within the next few days, pictures of James Flaherty appeared on TV and the newspaper and my reaction on both occasion was that this James Flaherty is double to our local Floyd Flaherty... they have to be related! Shortly thereafter, an old friend Dode Dealy, Dode's in his nineties, called and knowing my acquaintance with my hobby asked about James Flaherty - if he was Edwin Flaherty's grandson? Dode and Edwin lived in the same neighborhood as boys; Edwin would be eight years older but he was a pleasant and vivid memory to Dode all the same.

All of this forced my hand and drove me back to my files; to satisfied my curiosity and reaffirmed my convictions on the issue, case closed.

I inserted here a copy of Edwin R. Flaherty's obituary of 25 August, 1991.

**EDWIN B. FLAHERTY** died at his residence in Montreal on Aug. 25, 1991, he was 83. Born in 1908, he was raised in Loggieville. He attended St. Thomas High School in Chatham, NB, studied at St. Francis Xavier University in Antigonish NS and obtained a Bachelor of Science degree from Dalhousie University in 1932. He subsequently joined NB International Paper Company in Dalhousie. Moving to Montreal in 1946, he embarked on a career in chemicals related to the pulp and paper industry. In 1960, he founded Dorset Industrial Chemicals Limited and served as president until his retirement in 1975. The company remains in family hands under his son Ted K. Flaherty. He is survived by his wife Mary (Harquail) Flaherty, eight children, and 18 grandchildren.

James Flaherty MP is one of the 18 grandchildren.

A little Flaherty genealogy as it is reflected in Loggieville. Prior to the 1890's Loggieville was

referred to as Black Brook and after 1996 it became part of the City of Miramichi. Prior to 1874 there were no Flaherty's in Black Brook between 1875 and 1880. Frances Flaherty, widower, and family of eight moved to Black Brook, some of them very adult for Frank and his son Thomas were brought to work as filers at Vaughan's Mill. The family lived (rented) the Morrison house presently the home of Donald Lobban and family at the corner of Water and Manse (the Bulman Lane in the 1870's). As a clarification there were/are five Francis (Frank) Flaherty's in this family tree, of which, two are half brothers in the second generation and two others 1<sup>st</sup> cousins in the 3<sup>rd</sup> generation.

- I. The original **FRANCES (FRANK) FLAHERTY**<sup>1</sup> (1835-1900) married three times. His first wife died in childbirth, the child:
  - a. **Francis**<sup>2</sup> (1855-1937) came to Black Brook after his father had lived there for a while. This Frank (Jr) died and was buried in Loggieville.
- I. **FRANCES (FRANK) FLAHERTY**<sup>1</sup> second wife, Mary McKnight died approximately 1875, subsequently Mr. Flaherty arrived in Black Brook widowed (twice) with eight children in tow ages two through twenty one. His children were Mary Ann<sup>2</sup>, James<sup>2</sup>, Thomas<sup>2</sup>, John<sup>2</sup>, Martha<sup>2</sup>, Frances P.<sup>2</sup>, Julie<sup>2</sup>, and Willie<sup>2</sup>. Note that child number seven is also named Francis, aka Francis Patrick. Three of this set of siblings married and raised families in Black Brook / Loggieville; e.g.,
  - a. **James**<sup>2</sup> married Elizabeth Blake and they had three children (Lillian<sup>3</sup>, Francis<sup>3</sup>, and Ellen<sup>3</sup>) before leaving the area.
  - b. **Willie**<sup>2</sup> (1874-1939) married Mary Ann Landry, they had six children; namely, Eileen<sup>3</sup>, Mary<sup>3</sup>, William<sup>3</sup>, Margaret<sup>3</sup>, Reggie<sup>3</sup> and Lawrence<sup>3</sup>. This family lived and grew up on Harriman Street before moving elsewhere. The house is presently owned by Rollie Sweezey.
    - i. The **Reggie**<sup>3</sup> Flaherty mentioned here drowned at Tyrell's Point in a swimming mishap in 1938, thus creating the "fear of swimming at Tyrell's Point" for years thereafter.
  - c. **Francis P.**<sup>2</sup> (**Frank**) (1872-1949) married Mary Josephine Landry on 6 August 1902 and they raised their family of eight. For the first 23 years of marriage Frank<sup>2</sup> and Josephine lived in the same house as his father, the original Frank<sup>1</sup>, who had died in 1900, two years prior to the wedding. But in 1925, Frank<sup>2</sup> and family moved to the James Murdoch house at what is now



Manderson's Beach. Since that time this house has been moved across the road and a bit to the west as the home of Mike and Mary Mott. Their family list of eight includes Francis J.<sup>3</sup>, Edward<sup>3</sup>, Mary C.<sup>3</sup>, Susan<sup>3</sup>, John W.<sup>3</sup>, Helen<sup>3</sup>, Anne<sup>3</sup> and Joseph<sup>3</sup>. Three of this family married and stayed in Loggieville; Francis<sup>3</sup>, Susan<sup>3</sup> and Anne<sup>3</sup>.

- i. **Anne<sup>3</sup>** married Parker Godfrey.
- ii. **Susan<sup>3</sup>** married Wilbur Murdock
- iii. **Francis J.<sup>3</sup>** (1902-1965) married Bertha Martin of Hardwicke in 1925. As a closing note on this line, Francis<sup>3</sup> and Bertha Flaherty raised their six children after taking up residence in the MacIntyre (hotel) house on Water Street. It's demolished now but used to be part of the O'Leary business complex. (Next door to the present Tex and Barb McLeneghan Home). This family of Arthur<sup>4</sup>, Rosella<sup>4</sup>, Norma<sup>4</sup>, Josse<sup>4</sup>, Gerald<sup>4</sup>, and Floyd<sup>4</sup> grew up in Loggieville, but only Norma<sup>4</sup> and Josse<sup>4</sup> still reside here.

- I. Getting back to the original **FRANCES (FRANK) FLAHERTY<sup>1</sup>** we pick up with his third marriage when he married Mary Ann McLeod (1856- ) in 1880? They had five children; e.g. Harris<sup>2</sup>, Vincent<sup>2</sup>, Stella<sup>2</sup>, Frederick<sup>2</sup>, and Edward<sup>2</sup>.
  - a. **Edward<sup>2</sup>** was born in 1890 died at age 6 or 17.
  - b. **Frederick<sup>2</sup>** born in 1889 and died at age 23.
  - c. **Vince<sup>2</sup>** (1882-1960) did not marry, but lived a fruitful and community minded life. Vince<sup>2</sup> became a first class tinsmith with A&R Loggie's and managed the Baseball Bisons Club for many years taking the team to NB Championships in 1936 and 1938, acquiring a Maritime title the first round and the NB-PEI honors in 1938.
  - d. **Stella<sup>2</sup>** (1886-1960) did not marry, but lived a fruitful and community minded life. Stella<sup>2</sup> taught school in Loggieville for 44 years (a record tenure) at the primary level.
  - e. **HARRIS<sup>2</sup>** (1881-1943) was the only sibling of this family set to marry. In 1907 at age 26 he married Annie Isabel Harriman daughter of Phones Harriman and Margaret Murdoch (of Lower Napan). They had one child Edwin B.<sup>3</sup>. Phinneas Harriman had acquired the land tract of 66 acres from David Hutchison in the mid 1860's and eventually built his homestead on the corner of Water Street and what would become Harriman Street. He provided access to property on his holdings for his children, subsequently Harris

Flaherty<sup>2</sup> and wife Annie. They built their home toward the back of the Harriman strip on what is now Wellington Street, namely the present home of Harold Gallant (aka Blake Harriman place). This is where Edwin<sup>3</sup> grew up as a neighbor to Dode Dealy who lived in what is presently the Greg Watling home on Manse Street. In closing, Harris Flaherty<sup>2</sup> was a business man and on one venture he was half owner of the Flaherty and Harriman Mill at the mouth of the Black Brook (on the east side). His obituary tells the rest of the story.

- i. **EDWIN B.<sup>3</sup>** born in 1908, (see above obituary dated 25 August, 1991).

There are few Flaherty's remaining in Loggieville, but Jim Flaherty's roots do run through here for his Great grandfather Francis<sup>1</sup> and his grandfather Harris<sup>2</sup> were both buried in St. Andrew's Cemetery in 1900 and 1943 respectively and his look-a-like Floyd, who is coming back!

**TO KEEP A PAGE OF NB HISTORY**

Middle Sackville's Campbell Carriage Factory Museum goes online this fall with story of historic business.

**Sackville** – Campbell Carriage Factory Museum in Middle Sackville is going virtual on the Internet this fall as part of a combined historical and educational based project to spotlight a page of history for all to see.

The carriage factory built in the late 1930's was closed in the late 1940's bowing out to the automobiles. The owners, the Campbell family went from building horse-drawn hearses at the time to opening a funeral home.

The building and contents were donated in 1996 to the local historical group Tantrammar Heritage Trust and opened up to the public a couple of years ago as a

monument to the bygone era where horse power was supreme and when the company was an extremely important local industry and Middle Sackville the hub of the region, says the trust administrator.

Adle Hempel said the trust recently received just under \$30,000 to help prepare a virtual tour of the factory and many of its tour of the factory and many of its 6,000 artifacts for viewing on the Virtual Museums of Canada website operated by the federal government which will make the museum and items inside available in cyberspace for the world to see.

The second aspect of the project dubbed The Carriage Factory Built on Horsepower is to create an education tool. School teachers and students will be able to access the museum site through the Internet and learn about local history and the pre-modern era when horses and made-to-order carriages, wagons and buggies were the norm. The area was a going concern through the decades with the marshes an important supply of hay some of which was exported into the United States, said Hempel.

The factory was intact when the doors were closed in the 1940's. All of the contents including artifacts dating well into the 1800's were saved and can be displayed. It's the oldest intact carriage factory in Canada and the most complete factory in North America, she said. Before the factory, it was a tannery School districts

- 1) French speaking
- 2) English speaking

Encompassing most schools in the southeast region will have input into the project by helping evaluate and tailor the information to fit the classrooms and teaching programs. The school teachers will be able to prepare different activities for their classes from the virtual site, said Hempel.

Louis Filiatrault, Associate Director General with the Department of Canadian Heritage, said the project was an ideal way to share the Campbell Carriage Factory Museum with Canadians. There is no other museum quite like this in all of Canada, she agreed. The project is part of Canada's strategy to create and promote Canadian cultural content in cyberspace.

The museum only has provincial historical recognition. "The good news," said Trust President Paul Bogaard is that the project "will infuse considerable new monies into Sackville because all phases will be completed here in our own community – including artistic layout and design, photography, sound recordings, animation, translation, and mounting of the modules online."

Trust staff and volunteers have begun drafting story lines for the five modules its unique location overlooking the

Tantramar marshes; the range of horse-drawn vehicles required to meet local needs; the layout of work in a pre-industrial factory setting, the mechanics of hooking up horsepower, and research methods for extrapolating information from primary material.

Typically, most failed attempts at spelling genealogy put the "O" where the letter "A" belongs. Like this: geneology. Remember the sentence and you'll be able to spell the word correctly every time. **Genealogists Examine Needed Evidence At Lots Of Grave Yards.**

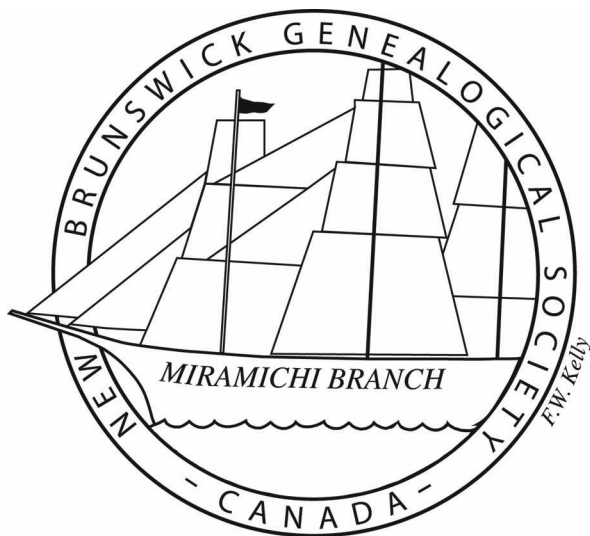
### **Dear members,**
