KOUCHIBOUGUAC NATIONAL PARK

During an interview with Pierrette Robichaud, Heritage Interpreter, she informs me that they have cleared a good section of the William's Roman Catholic Cemetery. They have found 38 tombstones as of yet; some date back as far as 1844. The names visible on these tombstones are: Grant, Stewart, Russell, McIntyre, Lamkie, Ryne, McYnnes, Harrington, McAuley, Allen. They are still working on clearing out the rest of the cemetery. The cemetery is open to the public and is located on Route 117, from Kouchibouguac going towards Pointe-Sapin, the parking lot after the Tweedie Trail. There will be a sign indicating that the cemetery is near and to take the trail located off the parking lot. They are presently improving the trail leading to the cemetery, so it can accessible to all visitors. Work on the cemetery is scheduled to be completed this fall, and then an update will follow.

Beginners Learn From Others Mistakes By Dianne Mullin

As winter approaches us, we are looking for a new project or hobby to keep us busy over the cold winter months we experience here on the Miramichi. Not everyone can afford to go south to warmer countries. Personally I indulge myself in genealogy. A cold blustery day one can curl up to a good book, organize old photo ablums which have been left untouched for years or search several sites on the internet for information on your relatives. Trips to our local libraries can turn up census records, tombstone transcriptions and information from local newspapers.

Genealogy is one of the fastest growing hobbies in Canada. The researcher of the past relied on ancestry charts, hand or typewritten notes and oral interviews. Today with modern technology we all have home computers, digital and video cameras and the ability to fly across this country in few hours.

Great! You've made the decision to trace your family tree! You're excited, enthused and anxious to uncover all that the information you can find on your family. Before long you may run into some brick walls or uncooperative relatives. You are not alone. Every family has a shaky limb and some relatives will go to extreme lengths to keep you from finding out the truth. Some will lie to lead you down a different path while others will out right say "no comment" and send you on your way.

Here are some of the common mistakes I have made and I am sure several others also would say "if I knew then, what I know now!"

1. Not having a research strategy. Information can easily snowball and many of us burn out due to lack of focus early in the game. Start with yourself and go back in time. Decided which lines of your family you wish to research and focus on them first. You have to decide if you are listing direct ancestors or including collateral relatives.

- 2. Not researching your Family Tree program before purchasing one: If you are going to enter your family information on a computer purchase a program which will suit your needs. There are several reliable ones on the market so some research is needed to pick the right one for you. Ask other researchers what they use and establish a list of the pros and cons. Each program has its own unique design. Some are more user friendly than others, some display better photos and others display unique charts. Personally I lost a database with 42,000 names because I did not have a backup copy which was compatible and the program had its own unique back up system.
- 3. Not interviewing your oldest living relatives: I am a victim of this as well. When I started researching I was more interested in obtaining birthdates and death dates than interviewing. When I got around to it, my oldest living relatives had passed away. Today, I am unable to find where my great great grandparents were buried, where some of this lady's half siblings were living, and the list goes on. If I had taken the time to set up an interview, this information would not have been lost.
- 4. Expecting correct dates and spellings: I've been in contact with researchers who have insisted on only searching for surnames with one particular spelling. Be open to spelling errors. Keep a list of all possible spellings, especially those based on sound. For example, I am researching the surname Hayden. In old records it was spelled Haden, Haydn, Haiden. Birthdates can be confused with baptism dates. You may find three birthdates. You will then have to decipher which one is probably correct.
- 5. Copying information from the World Wide Web: If you find information that looks like it could be your family, take note of each piece of information and check its source. Your best bet is to forget about this find and look for your own sources.
- 6. Overlooking clues. When checking death records, etc. read the entire document and review it more than once. You could be missing very important clues. For example, I was reading a death certificate of a John Hayden. He died in the same time frame, in the same town, had the same next of kin listed. I thought I had found my gentleman. Months later when I reviewed my

- photocopy, I noticed this man was listed as a widow. The second wife of my John Hayden was much alive. Needless to say, I had the wrong man.
- 7. Taking family interviews as being correct: When setting up an interview prepare a list of questions which is important in your research. Remember, like in the census, sometimes the person will hide the truth. He will deliberately lead out a child, perhaps born out of wedlock.
- 8. Forgetting Etiquette: certain rules of genealogical etiquette exist that beginners should follow: when requesting information by mail, always include a self-addressed stamped envelope for the reply. When interviewing relatives who won't talk about family history may be trying to erase memories of a troublesome situation or hide a secret. One has to respect their decision to do so and move on. Not everyone is as interested in the family history as you are and not everyone may want to participate. Have patience and keep your interview session within a reasonable timeframe. Follow up your interview with a thank you note.
- 9. **Giving Up Too Soon**: When you get into genealogy, consider this a long journey worth travelling.

Even after reading and overcoming these suggestions, you will make mistakes from time to time. The use of database programs and the Internet has made your research easier but there will still be brick walls to overcome and many bruises and bumps along the way. Genealogy research is a continuous learning process and an addiction as well as a hobby and that's the fun of it!

PRESS RELEASE August 2, 2007

On Sunday, July 29th, 2007, Mr. Dean Lawrence, Chair of Miramichi Presbytery, United Church of Canada, assisted by Rev. Ron Feltmate and Mrs. Heather Fleiger as organist, (all of the Miramichi), conducted an elegant Service for Closure and Disbandment of the St. John's United Church in Shippagan, NB.

United Church in Shippagan, NB. Following the Organ Prelude on the grand ornate pedal organ by Mrs. Fleiger to a full church audience (83 signed the guest book), trustees Holly Daley (Miramichi) and David Morrison (Fredericton) [trustee Merle MacDonald (Rothesay) absent due to health] extended a warm welcome and the recognition/appreciation announcements to the many people who provided support for the preservation of the church and cemetery over many years. Following introduction, His Worship, the Mayor, Jonathan Roch Noël, spoke very cordially on behalf of the Council and residents of Shippagan on the long history of the Anglophone and Francophone members of the community living and working in harmony to build the town to what it is today. The Mayor stated that the Town is very proud and pleased to (1) recognize the special bond between our ancestors as a great national example of cultural cooperation and (2) assume ownership (soon to be) of the property and its associated responsibility for the preservation of the church building and cemetery as an historic site. Mr. Lawrence then conducted the Call to Worship and the Dedication of the Memorial Cairn that was erected to briefly outline the history of the property as a church and cemetery as well as the alphabetical listing of all persons (74) known or believed to be buried in the cemetery. The scripture readings were: *Deuteronomy 32:1-9*; Psalm 119:89-96; Revelation 7:17; and Matthew 11:28-30. The hymns were: "Breathe on me, Breath of God", "Take Time to be Holy", "Here, O My Lord, I see You Face to Face", and "He Leadeth Me: O Blessed *Thought*". The title of Mr. Lawrence's message was "Finding Rest". Mr. Lawrence and Rev. Feltmate also offered the service of Communion to persons present before Mr. Lawrence completed the service for closure and disbanding.

Following the service, Mr. Lawrence, Rev. Feltmate, trustees Holly Daley & David Morrison, with Mayor Noël, Deputy Mayor Bernice Doiron-Chiasson, Councilors Patrice-Eloi Mallet, Rémi Hébert & Wilfred Gaudet, and former Mayors Raymond A. H. Haché &

Valerien Robichaud, conducted the unveiling of the beautiful memorial cairn. The cairn (a large granite stone) has two memorial polished granite bilingual plaques (front and back). The English portion on the front plaque states the following:

"Saint John's Church

This is the site of the first Anglophone Protestant church and cemetery in the Acadian Peninsula. The church was built to meet the spiritual needs of the persons of the Protestant faith who came to Shippagan and the surrounding area from far (Scotland and the Isle of Jersey) and near (the Miramichi) to participate in the local fishery and forestry related industries.

The story begins with the purchase of this land from the late Honourable Joseph Cunard on February 7, 1842 by Joshua Alexandre, James Blackhall, Hugh A. Caie, Alexander Campbell and John Doran, the first Trustees of Saint John's Church of the Established Church of Scotland.

The Chatham *Gleaner* reports in its November 9th, 1847 publication the opening of a 'fully finished and painted outside pretty little church in the wilderness'. The article further states 'the Christian zeal and energy displayed by the scattered inhabitants of Shippegan [sic] and the adjoining settlements, in their noble enterprise of erecting a Temple ..., to the service of God, is beyond all praise; and it is hoped that their example will be speedily followed by many settlements ...'.

The first church served its congregation until it was destroyed by fire around 1900. The present church building was finished in 1903. In 1925, the congregation became part of the Miscou/Shippagan Mission field of the United Church of Canada and the church was known thereafter as St. John's United Church until it was decommissioned in 2007."

The English portion of the polished granite plaque on the back (facing the cemetery) states the following:

"Saint John's Cemetery

Alexandre, Esquire, Joshua, 1802-1859 Baldwin, Doctor Thomas Spelman, d. in 1857, his wife & 3 children are also buried here.

A Captain's body, washed ashore at Shippegan Gully in the 1890's, is buried here.

Doctor Baldwin and John Doran cared for 165 Irish immigrants who landed in Shippigan on the ship "Lisa Liddel" in 1847. Many died of fever on the way over and it is not known if any who perished are buried here."

In addition to his wonderful work on the memorial cairn. the trustees commended Yves Thériault. Monument Ste-Anne, Bertand, NB, for his great artisan work on the repair and refurbishment of the 26 remaining headstones in the cemetery. They also thanked the Town of Shippagan for its installation of the new fencing that completes the surrounding of the cemetery, as well as their provision (including installation) of the cemetery's encircling hedge. In addition, commendation was made to Edward Hitchman, Hitchman Construction Ltd., and the Robichaud family (Valerien, Gilles & Marc-Andre), Les Entreprises Shippagan Ltd, for their great work and support on the cairn and cemetery improvements.

After the unveiling of the cairn, those present shared in fellowship, conversation, food and refreshments provided by the congregation and the Town under a bright sunny sky.

People signing the guest book indicated they were from the following New Brunswick area communities: Bertrand (1), Fredericton (3), Janeville & area (6), Miramichi (10), Miscou (10), Moncton (1), Sackville (4), Saint John (2), Shippagan & area (28), and Tabusintac (4). Out-of-province attendees were from Brampton (1), Hamilton (2), Montreal & area (8), Ottawa (2), and Yuma, Arizona (1).

I'm wondering if anyone has some ideas for me... My great-grandparents, Alexander Bishop Underhill and Margaret Catherine O'Brien, were married about 1901

but I don't know precisely when and where - it's just one detail, but the blank space it leaves annoys me greatly!

Here's what I know:

Alexander and Margaret were both listed, as single, on the 1901 Census in the households of their parents, so I assume (I hate to do that, but it seems safe in this case) that they were not married at that time. The date for that census was March 31, 1901. Their first child, Herman, was born May 15, 1902. Given that, one can guess they

were married between those two dates.

I have checked the indexes at PANB, trying both names, soundex, and misspellings, and found nothing. How I wish those records could be browsed by date! Anyway, I'm guessing that my next place to check would be church records. Both Alexander and Margaret were Catholic. He was from Barnettville, and she from somewhere in Blackville Parish, Blackville or Renous, specifically, I think. So that leaves St. Raphael's or St. Bridget's. They lived in the same spot all their married life (Barnettville) and were buried at St. Raphael's, so that would be my first thought, but it could be St. Bridget's if Margaret was from Renous.

So... who do I talk to about church records? Do I contact the church directly? I'm not sure of the etiquette on that. Does St. Michael's Museum have what I'm looking for? Can they do simple lookups or do you have to do the whole family file research thing? Does the branch hold any church records? Or maybe does PANB have microfilm?

Can someone point me in the right direction on this? Remember, this is long distance!:)

A Genealogy Show 'n' Tell meeting was held at 6 p.m. at the Chatham Library. Most people who attended brought items relating to the family research they were doing.

Plen D. surprised us all with a Chivas Regal box containing something unusual. Instead of a bottle of the real thing, he reached in and produced a bottle of formaldehyde containing...his father's appendix, surgically removed by local doctor Losier when the Plen's dad was only 13. .But the box was also a treasure since Plen's daughter is married to an officer of the company.

Carolyn H. brought two deposit receipts from the Post Office in Richibucto. These were of significant interest since that was the year Carolyn's family moved here from England. It was common in England to do banking at the Post Office. One receipt was in the mothers name and the other was in the name of Carolyn's younger brother. Carolyn reminded us to save old papers when we are doing the cleaning

Mary H. brought 2 silver calling card cases which had belonged to her grandmother. Ladies used calling cards when visiting. She also brought a beautiful ivory box which had contained items of a dresser set. Mary's grandmother was a daughter of Dr. Sprague and the items were engraved B.S.

Barbara M. had a "tally stick" found at her father's home with names and numbers on it. Discussion followed concerning what it was used for and Don felt it was for measuring fish and it was from about 1900.

Sally D. brought an engraved golden watch chain that had belonged to her great-grandfather Stephenson. He brought it with him when he came to Miramichi from the Orkney Islands in 1835 at the age of 19.

Bill D. showed us a Will from 1839 in which a family bible was passed down to a family member. He also had photocopies of the bible, an inscription and copies of a law book.

Bernie W. described recent family research and showed letters received from a newly-found relative living in the western USA.

Dianne M. teased us by showing an item and asked us to guess what it was. Mary H. and Sally D were not fooled! They knew it was an ivory tool for stretching the fingers of kid gloves!

Marshall G. brought an assortment of old newspapers from the '50s, a book about Queen Mary, clippings and letters saved by the family and...a bailey plane belonging to his great-grandfather with the same name. So Marshall's plane is monogrammed MG.

Dollypearle showed us original family documents: a marriage license of her great-grandmother (1884), military discharge papers (1833), and an early hydro bill for \$1.00 when electricity was 'new'.

Judy V. brought pewter jewelry from Australia given to her by a cousin. The cousin's ancestor went there from NB in 1880. He had been a trapper and fur trader before marriage. When they left for Australia, they took their piano with them and it was recently donated to the museum in Bendigo, Victoria.

Della and Doris brought a footed teacup which was a wedding gift to their grandmother who married on Dec. 25, 1912. It is very fancy, with gold and bright colours.

According to the Antiques Roadshow, footed teacups were very popular at that time.
