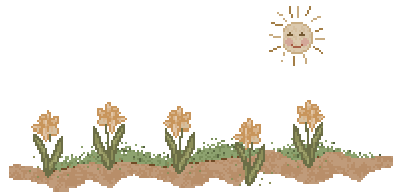

This is where we can display information about an ancestor whom you believe is worthy of note and wish the world to know about. The information (story) could contain information about when the person arrived in the county, how they earned a living, marital status, if they had a family, and, if so, how many children they had. It could also have any interesting tidbit that you may have about the living conditions or connections about the individual. All registered members should have received two e-mails from the program. One is from the administrator giving you information about the program. The information sheet also has your user name and password to give you access to the NBGS WIKI program. The second e-mail you should have received is from the WIKI program, inviting you to go to the WIKI site and sign in using the assigned user name and password. If any member has problems with the program they are encouraged to e-mail the program administrator at genealogy@nbgsmiramichi.org for help or information.

The purpose of this section of the NBGS MIRAMICHI website is to provide an online facility that the members of NBGS Miramichi Branch may use to contribute Genealogy information on selected topics. Pages will be created on NBGSWIKI on selected topics and each member will have the opportunity to edit and provide information on each of these pages. Attached is a notification outlining proposed changes to our procedure for dealing with receipts and membership cards.

With the approval of the local members and so moved and adopted at our last meeting, it was decided to include the attached letter in the next issue of the branch newsletter so that all members will be informed.

Attention! Proposed Changes to Membership Procedures

At a recent executive meeting, while discussing how to keep operational costs down, we considered ways to try to change our method of sending out receipts for membership dues. Doing so would eliminate some postage and stationary expenses.

As it now stands, a receipt and a membership card are automatically sent to members upon receipt of dues. The receipt is in acknowledgement for money received (which also is made known to members when their checks are cashed) and the membership card allows access to our local library materials and provides your code number for access to our Website.

Through discussion it was determined that most receipts and membership cards serve no purpose and, where it is necessary, they will still be mailed out upon request.

Some proposed changes include:

- Receipts for money received will be mailed out only upon request.
- Membership cards will be mailed out only upon request.

(Proposed Changes to Membership Procedures Continued):

For those out-of-town members visiting the area, instead of a membership card, the Miramichi (Chatham) Library will keep a master membership list to check ID should a visiting member want access to our materials. The code for the Website can be emailed to most members. Local members could have receipts and membership cards passed out at a meeting instead of being mailed.

ARTICLE FROM AN OLD NEWSPAPER

The Wreck of the Martha, 1783: Transcript, Summary and Commentary;

The following is a transcript of the account of the sinking of the transport "Martha", an English ship carrying Loyalist soldiers, their families, slaves, and goods from New York City to Saint John, Nova Scotia (soon to be New Brunswick) at the end of the American Revolution. The document source is the January 11, 1919 *Acadian Recorder*, page 10, under the regular column heading: "Occasional's Letter". The scrapbook copy of this newspaper article is held at the Nova Scotia Public Archives in Halifax, Nova Scotia. A search did not produce a microfilm copy and the transcription reads in its entirety as follows from the scrapbook edition:

Paragraph #1 (continued):

"The situation of the poor people on board at this crisis became truly lamentable. Their grand resource being lost, the cutter and the jolly boat on remained from which they could possibly hope for safety. At this time the ship was full of water, it must be allowed, but she was fast aground the rocks, and every sea beat over her deck, but no material part had given way, the mast only excepted. In this situation the master ordered the jolly boat to be launched over the side, rowed to the cutter, which lay off, got into her, and after taking in a few men who, in that moment of desperation, swam out to the boat, he inhumanely pushed off for shore, turning the jolly boat adrift and empty, in full view of the unhappy people on board, who, in vain called out to him for relief, and contrary to the solicitations of the commanding officer on board, who requested him to come towards the stern of the ship and concert some plan for the general safety and to the comfort of the poor unhappy souls on board." SUGGESTIONS FOR FAMILY RESEARCH

1921 Canadian Census Set to be Released in 2013

According to the Census Resources the 1921 Canadian census was taken on June 1, 1921 and Statistics Canada will release this date in June 2013, 92 years after it was gathered.

Besides the full name of everyone in the household, along with their sex, age, marital status and religion enumerators gathered data on their civic address, whether they rented or owned their residence, the type of dwelling, the number of rooms in the dwelling, Questions were also asked regarding where they were born, along with their parents, immigration to Canada and their nationality, the language they spoke, their level of education, their occupation, and their age at the time of recording.

Canada changed drastically between 1911 and 1921. It's as if it matured from a British colony into a self-sufficient country. War, flu epidemics, immigration and migration on the home front and abroad, not only affected the population, but also the dispersion of it.

The First World War saw a massive movement of young men from rural areas to military training bases across the country and eventually overseas. More than 619,000 Canadian men and women served in the Great War. Of those, 66,665 were killed and more than 172,000 were wounded.

It will be interesting to see the results of these numbers in the 1921 Canada Census. It may help researchers unravel the mysteries of families who were separated or displaced because of fathers being killed overseas or found unfit to work and support their loved ones because of permanent injuries.

Web Portal tells Story of New Brunswick Scottish Settlers

A web portal is being developed in the province to tell the story of the Scottish Settlers and their descendants. The NB Scottish Cultural Association Inc. in collaboration with the New Brunswick Archives is in the process of developing a web portal similar to the Irish portal already in place in the province.

It will reflect provincial history drawing from every Scottish Settlement in the province since the 19th century. It will include passenger lists, immigrant papers, newspaper articles, census information, and genealogical and historical information. The project will begin with Northumberland County and then gather information from other areas of the province.

FIRST FAMILIES PROJECT

First Families Workshops have already begun. The typing and proof reading is being done. The First Families project is going to print as soon as possible and help is always appreciated. Contact any society officer to volunteer or to submit First Families' information. We require basic facts such as arrival date in Northumberland County and where they came from, full name, birth date, marriage date with spouse's name & dates, and parents' names (if possible), occupation, and names of children, religion, and where they lived.

If the narrative is too long, the editors must spend a lot of time weeding out extra information; however, if the newcomer is significant to the overall river valley history, one or two extra paragraphs are acceptable. The idea has been to keep each family to a page, but this is not possible when they have more than about eight children. In order to keep things simple, condense everything. We are simply giving people bare facts that can be found in government and parish records--nothing that should need "approval" unless there is an illegitimate child that is being protected. Since we're dealing, primarily, with people who arrived in the early 1800s, our biggest concern is distinguishing between fact and fiction.

Some ancestors told tales that aren't true, but which have been handed down through the generations. We have found many errors in names, dates, etc., in the first volume, which we're correcting as we sort through the records.

COMMUNITY PLACE NAMES IN NEW BRUNSWICK, CANADA

Extractions with permission of Robert F. Fellows

Douglasfield: Settlement, 3 mi. SW of Chatham, on the road to Chatham Head: Chatham Parish, Northumberland County: Archibald Douglas was a settler: in 1871 community and surrounding district had a population of 400: PO 1883-1951: in 1898 Douglasfield was a farming settlement with 1 post office and a population of 50: today it is part of the city of Miramichi.

Douglastown: Settlement on N side Miramichi River, 1 mi. W of Chatham and 1 mi. E of Nordin: Newcastle Parish, Northumberland County: it was first called Gretna Green for town in Scotland: it was renamed to mark an official visit by Sir Howard Douglas (1776-1861) who was lieutenant governor of NB 1823-1832: PO from 1835: in 1866 Douglastown was a farming, fishing and lumbering community with approximately 82 families: in 1871 Douglastown had a population of 400: in 1898 it had 1 post office, 6 stores, 1 hotel, 2 sawmills, 2 churches and a population of 600: it was incorporated as a village in 1966: today Douglastown is part of the city of Miramichi.

Doyles Brook: Settlement on the S side of the Southwest Miramichi River, 2 mi. E of Quarryville, on road to McKinleyville: Nelson Parish, Northumberland County: PO 1885-1954: in 1898 Doyles Brook was a farming, fishing and lumbering settlement with 1 post office and a population of 100: today it is a dispersed community.

Drisdelle Settlement: Community, 2 mi. NW of Lagacéville, on road to Saint-Wilfred: Alnwick Parish, Northumberland County: today Drisdelle Settlement is a dispersed community.

Dumphy: See Upper Blackville (Blackville Parish, Northumberland County),

Dungarvin Settlement: Former community near Renous Bridge (became Quarryville): Derby Parish, Northumberland County: named for Dungarvan, Ireland: in 1866 it was a farming settlement with approximately 8 resident families.

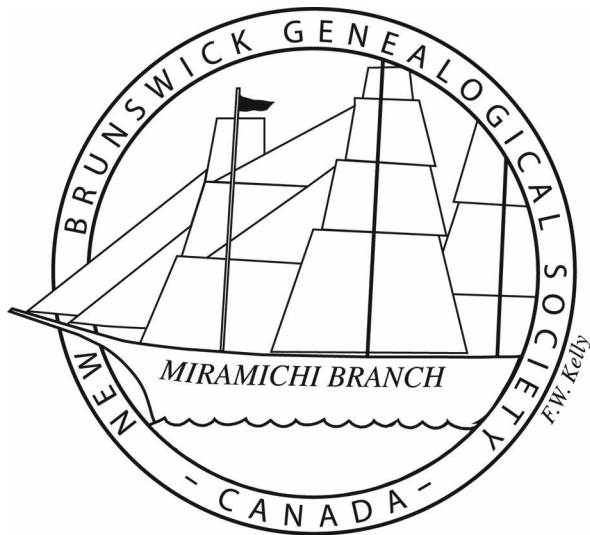
